Order of Business

A. Call to Order

- a. Kelly Called meeting to order 3:32pm

B. Approval of 1-23-17 Minutes

- a. June Powers sent clarification for 1/23/17 minutes: Item G.g needs to be changed to “Omar Torres commented on concern from SGA about recent policy to add printing cost for students in the library (.35 color/.10 b/w per copy)”.

C. Approval of Agenda

- a. Agenda approved.

D. Report from the Chair

- a. Kelly: Updated committee on NANSTI *project* – “*Social Belonging for Student Success*”.

E. Report from the Chair, Student Publication Board no report - next meeting is Tuesday Feb. 28th

- a. No report. Next SPB meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, February 28th.

F. Report from Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs

- a. See Attached Appendix i.
- b. Justice inquired if swim team funds go through student affairs.
 - i. LS confirmed that Student Affairs funds do help with the Swim school for community.
- c. Justice remarked that students often don't have funds to purchase textbooks - cost of living may be higher in surrounding areas vs. on campus.

- d. Suggestions/comments followed:
 - ii. Schaeffer suggested funds be set aside and allocated specifically for books.
 - iii. Torres offered use more affordable sources (amazon prime vs. bookstore).
 - iv. Oswald mentioned that textbook cost be included in new student orientation.
 - v. Kelly suggested first generation college students session could assist with this issue.
 - vi. Rokes suggested setting up a credit system so money could be transferred to the bookstore directly after funds are available to the student.
 - vii. Oswald suggested exploring other Scholarship options for textbooks.
 - viii. Kelly suggested setting up social media site for students who want to sell books.
 - ix. Schaeffer will contact Financial Aid to have questions answered about delay in funding or setting up a credit system or emergency fund or scholarships for books or any additional funding available for students.

G. Report from Student Government Association

- a. Logan John will not be able to join SACL meetings due to a class conflict.
- b. Kiana Swan – brought to SGA to recognize for film award and showcased video.
- c. Two resolutions passed during the last SGA mtg: 1) support of model UN fee which will be cut from student fees next year – Model UN and other academic teams are supported by SGA
2) SGA does not support Atlantic Coast Pipeline
- d. Addressing Goal for Violence Prevention: An idea was proposed to place stickers around campus about being an active bystander. Stickers would include suicide hotline number and strategies to prevent violence – important “hotline” numbers in community would be listed (local police, rape hotline, etc.). Stickers will be placed in areas with high concentration of foot traffic – and also private locations such as restrooms.
- e. Justice commented that it may be a good idea to expand location of stickers – for example in classrooms.

H. Old Business

- a. Update on Activity Period Survey:
 - i. Morrison stated that the data was well received. Gave information on details of the survey, that data was separated out by length of employment. She noted that the survey suggested faculty arriving prior to after 2011 offered overwhelming positive responses. The time frame (morning vs. afternoon) is worth looking into further. Data was not broken down by department. There were a total of 181 responses – 150 of 181 had experience with an activity period.
 - ii. Oswald spent weekend looking over comments – many comments regarded logistics. Many people opposing felt it was not necessary or would conflict with curricular offerings. Many folks pointed out that the activity period would disadvantage students who were involved in multiple clubs/activities. Oswald mentioned that one comment suggested the survey was biased.
 - iii. Rokes asked if there were there comments/feedback from Art or Music? Oswald said there were comments about a conflict with scheduling classes.
 - iv. Morrison posed a question: Do we have enough interest to go further?
 - v. Justice suggested student input.
 - vi. Torres will take the survey back to SGA to find ways to put student input together – (paper ballot or in person survey).
 - vii. Oswald posed another question: Do we want to survey the staff?

- viii. Schaeffer mentioned that it would be advantageous for staff plan programming.
 - ix. Morrison suggested concern for students filling out an “in person survey” - commuter students are not considered.
 - x. Torres suggested an information table as well as emailing the survey to student listserv. He will provide date for information table – TBD. Suggested questions: “what is your year”; “what is your major”; “how many organizations are you involved in”; “are you a commuter student”; and will include the same question about morning and afternoon.
 - xi. Morrison suggesting putting the student survey link on Facebook.
 - xii. Kelly mentioned SACL can present survey to Faculty Senate.
- b. Kelly shared the list of questions for Financial Aid Q&A Page to Faculty Senate for comments and suggestions. Will pass along to FA.

I. New Business

summer camp idea: taste of college (short instruction from several gen ed instructors)

- a. Kelly mentioned that Aaron Vandermeer inquired about getting first generation kids interested in college – to give them a taste of college. This would be an introduction to Gen Ed courses.
- b. Higy mentioned that a kids camp takes place during the summer and runs for a week – this is set up in Education (coming out of area of ComTech).
- c. Schaeffer mentioned that Cammie Hunt can provide a list of summer camps we offer.

Student Health Services Building: Total completed percentage is 73%. Final inspection is March 17 and the beneficial occupancy projected date is March 27. The ribbon cutting is scheduled for April 20.
