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Greetings from the Department Chair,

The 2004-2005 academic year is a threshold year. It is the beginning of my new responsibilities as Music Department Chair; it marks the startup of construction and renovation of Moore Hall; and it brings heightened emphasis on student achievement.

First, I would like to introduce myself to you. My credentials include a Bachelor of Music degree and Performer's Certificate in Clarinet from Indiana University, Master's degrees from Manhattan School of Music and Pace University, and a Doctor of Education degree from Teachers College of Columbia University. My professional career began with five years in the American Symphony Orchestra (ASO), under Leopold Stokowski, as solo clarinetist and member of the ASO Woodwind Quintet. My work continued in education, spanning over seven years in the New York City Public Schools as teacher and citywide coordinator of the Arts in General Education program and including work in suburban and "Upstate" districts as music supervisor, arts director, and high school principal. I have come to realize that all of these skills and experiences are valuable resources in my work at UNCP.

Second, you will see us in a variety of configurations through mid-2006. The new band room will emerge on the south side of Moore Hall, followed by second- and first-floor transformations. Along the way, we will be utilizing spaces in Old Main and in Jacobs and Mimosa Halls. Our over-twenty adjunct professors now have shared office spaces in Jacobs (that may be increasingly shared as time goes on). There is a great spirit of adventure among the students and faculty regarding all of these changes that will be of continuing value as we pack and unpack.

Finally, we are working in new ways to facilitate the musical and academic success of our students. Adjunct and full-time faculty members have met twice this year in daylong retreats. We are implementing new techniques as well as new curricula that are designed to meet the needs of our students, including digital portfolios, new assessment strategies, a Basic Musicianship class, department-based advisement, and an outreach program designed to facilitate student performance and service in the community.

I welcome you to our circle of supporters and encourage you to contact us with your questions, comments, or invitations for student involvement.

Dr. George R. Walter, **UNCP** Professor of Music since 1967, **Enters Phased Retirement** Program

On Monday evening, April 26, Dr. George R. Walter was honored at a dinner celebration in Pembroke, NC at Sheff's Restaurant. Dr. Walter is entering the UNC system's "Phased Retirement" program in the fall, after teaching in the music department at UNCP for 37 years. He served as chair of the department for the last 9 years. He will continue to teach half time for up to 3 additional years.

Faculty colleagues, music department alumni and friends, and current music students totaled 150 in attendance for the dinner and program presented in Walter's honor. The Walter family were the honored guests, including wife Norma, daughter Adrienne Lee, son-in-law Joe Lee from Atlanta, GA, and son Mark from Boston. MA.

Beth Maisonpierre served as Master of Ceremonies for the program. She noted Dr. Walter's many accomplishments during his tenure at UNCP, including watching the department grow to 100 majors and doubling the number of full-time faculty. It was under Walter's leadership as chair that the department began a Bachelor's degree in musical theatre and a Master's degree in music education.

During the evening Dr. Walter received several gifts including a plaque from the Office of Academic Affairs. The plaque was presented to him by the Provost and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Dr. Roger Brown. He also was given a notebook of letters of remembrance written to Walter by invited guests. An announcement was made of a \$1000 honorarium in Walter's name to be given to the University Music Society. This was collected from a variety of individuals and will be used for student scholarships.

Especially noteworthy was the presentation of the Orpheus Award by Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia president, Chris Pittman. The Orpheus Award is presented to a person who has significantly and lastingly contributed to the cause of music in America. Phi Mu Alpha governor approval is required for each Orpheus Award.

Dr. Walter also received the "Order of the Long Leaf Pine" award. This is the State of North Carolina's highest honor presented to a civilian for dedication and extended length of service to his or her organization. Other Tarheels who have received this honor include Dr. Billy Graham, Maya Angelou, and Charles Kuralt.

Faculty CD




2004 New Adjunct Faculty

Jazz News


The UNCP Jazz Choir and Ensemble will present their Moore Hall Fall Concert on Thursday, November 11, 2004 at 7:30 p.m. The concert will include special tributes to Count Basie and Fats Waller, both born 100 years ago. Fats Waller was an entertainer, singer and songwriter, but has made his mark in music history as an important and influential stride and early jazz pianist. One of the pianists he influenced was Count Basie, who went on from stride piano beginnings to define "swing" for the world and generations to come.

There are now two Jazz Combos meeting in addition to the Jazz Choir and Ensemble. All of the groups will be active in our busy fall calendar. September 24 & 25, the jazz groups will appear at Fayetteville's Fourth Friday and at the Mayor's Reception for the International Folk Festival. Student Activities has again asked the groups to provide a concert on October 2, for Parents Weekend, and the next week, October 7, we will help the Whiteville Chamber of Commerce in their fall fund raiser. We are very excited for these opportunities to represent UNCP and America's music to the community!



This show is a tribute to Fats Waller and is comprised of wonderful arrangements of his jazzy style. It is presented this year because 2004 marks the one-hundredth anniversary of his birth. The show won the Tony for "Best Musical" in 1978, and Nell Carter, who won "Best Actress in a Musical" that same year, became a star as a result.

The UNCP version will be set in the "Cotton Club" where students are both performers and cabaret members of the club. The cast includes Ian Siler as the emcee; Shauna Philips and Francine Powers as featured soloists; Krystal Nettles, Ellie Robbins, Amy Landry, Crystal Hall, Matthew Greenslade, David Crow, P.J. Choirs Continue to Grow

Like the rest of the department and school, the choirs continue to grow at UNCP. Dr. Gary Wright, the Choir Director reports that the Pembroke Singers, the auditioned choir, now has 36 singers - 18 men and 18 women. Concert Choir has 75 members. We welcomed about 10 new voice majors this semester, bringing our total to just under 40 voice majors in the department.

The choirs have already performed several times this semester. With only two rehearsals, the Singers performed the Alma Mater and National Anthem at Convocation on September 1, and both choirs performed for Pembroke Day on September 8. The choirs have a scheduled concert in GPAC on October 12. (We've outgrown Moore Hall Auditorium.)

Medieval Feast VI Scheduled

The sixth annual Medieval Feast is scheduled for two nights, December 10 and 11, in the Jones Auxiliary Gym at UNCP. This annual fund-raising event is a special evening of music and dining that helps the Music Department's scholarship program. The dinners begin at 6:30 and last about two and a half hours.

The Reluctant Dragon, or "Can't We All Get Along," is this year's theme. The Medieval Feast is dinner theater at its best. Guests are served a multi-course dinner by costumed "monks" while singers stroll through the tables entertaining. During dessert, the Pembroke Singers, dressed in their Renaissance finery, will present John Rutter's setting of "The Reluctant Dragon." This is a tale of a boy and a dragon (who doesn't want to fight) and how they try to change the attitude of the village. The evening ends with a short concert by the choirs and the favorite, "Night of Silence," with the singers and musicians surrounding the auditorium. Costumes, lighting and scenery combine to make this a magical experience.

Last year, the production played to over 750 patrons. Our goal this year is to perform for 1000. Tickets for the dinner and musical extravaganza go on sale November 1, at the music office (910.521.6230). Tickets are \$37.50 for an individual or \$375 for a table of 12 (twelve tickets for the price of 10). Half-tables are also available (6 tickets for the price of 5 for \$187.50).

Moore Hall Construction Update

The Music Department's share of the State's university bond money is 2.4 million. The department is stretching this to include a redesign of almost every room inside Moore Hall and the addition of nearly 5,000 square feet. By the time you read this, ground may have been broken on a new band room, additional restrooms on both floors, an elevator, new windows, increased technology capability and much, much more.

We are delayed a bit as we seek ways to save about \$300,000 on the project. The low bid came in at 2.7 million, and we are looking at ways to shave the overbid money. Keep tuned as the music building undergoes remodeling. The next three or four semesters will be challenging, since we will remain in the building as EVERYTHING changes around us. We'll keep you posted.
