Director's Report to the Task Force on Teaching Excellence University of North Carolina, Pembroke March 17, 2020

- The TLC's Engaged Faculty Scholars for Sustainability presented their work incorporating service-learning in classes that engage concepts of sustainability at N.C. Campus Compact's PACE conference in February at Elon University, and they continue to collaborate and are working toward publishing their work as a journal article.

- I am a member of a search committee seeking to fill the position of Employee Relations/Workforce Development Director in the Office of Human Resources, a position that aims to develop and support professional development and training opportunities for faculty.

Programming:

- Twenty faculty currently are pursuing Accessibility & Inclusion certification.
- The TLC sponsored, in collaboration with *Pembroke Magazine*, a poetry reading and creative-writing workshop by NC Poet Laureate Jaki Shelton Green on Jan. 27, in conjunction with my AIS/ENG 2410: Environmental Literature class. Ms. Green's creative-writing workshop prepared AIS/ENG 2410 students to lead a service-learning activity at Spring Hill Middle School on Feb. 26.
- The TLC hosted its second annual Celebration of Teaching & Learning, featuring
- The TLC assisted the Shared Interest Group for Globalizing the Curriculum, led by Cathy Lee Arcuino, to host Vice President Dawn Michele Whitehead of the Association of American Colleges & Universities on Feb. 26 for a presentation to faculty and to senior academic leadership and consultation with the SIG on issues of global citizenship for campus, community, and careers.
- Eight faculty participated in February's Book of the Month Club meeting and discussed bell hooks's *Teaching Community: A Pedagogy of Hope*.

Planning

- The TLC conducted needs assessments in the School of Education and the departments of Art; Counseling; Economics & Decision Sciences; and English, Theatre & Foreign Languages. The TLC has scheduled needs assessments in the departments of Finance & Accounting, Music, and Psychology. We hope to visit all departmental faculty meetings this semester to assess faculty needs and preferences for teaching and learning.
- The TLC is partnering with the Office of Sponsored Research & Programs, the Faculty Research Advisory Board, and the assistant deans for research to offer a Faculty Writers

- Retreat (now in its third year) from May 11 to 14, facilitated by interim Dean Teagan Decker (Honors College).
- The University College and TLC are collaborating to pilot an enhanced syllabus transformation program targeting student success in General Education courses.
- The Office of Online Learning and TLC are collaborating to enhance professional development for faculty teaching (or considering teaching) online, and we are planning research into effective professional development practices for presentation and/or publication.
- This year's POD Network conference emphasized three strategic foci for our work: (1) a needs assessment is fundamental to current practice and future strategy, and you as the members of this task force are critical to conducting and interpreting such assessment; (2) given the lack of participation of faculty generally in TLC programming and the diverse demographics of our student body, a students-as-partners emphasis will facilitate and maximize our efforts in supporting highly-engaged faculty generally and creating a diverse, equitable, and inclusive classrooms in particular; and (3) we can request and utilize institutional data in better understanding and asserting our impact.
- Student Assistants Martin and Rodgers are surveying badging/points systems for the purposes of increasing participation in TLC programming.
