

Studying Abroad Widens Horizons

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Introduction

The college experience is one that cannot be replicated by anything short of college. Adjunct activities, however, can raise consciousness, inspire action, and develop citizenship of the world. One such activity is Short-Term Study Abroad programs for undergraduates.

This poster seeks to support this hypothesis by an informal survey from students having recently returned from a trip to Belize, in 2018 and 2019.

We hope to show by responses and literature review that funding for short term study abroad projects is money well-spent.

What is it?

Short-term study abroad describes trips to other countries outside the U.S. to expose students to culture and life different from theirs.

A two or three-week party or school break. It is led and organized by faculty.

Methods

Since this is not yet at a stage where it is a formal study, no formal or empirical data was collected.

This was a short, 7-Question informal post-trip survey, conducted in both 2018 and 2019. Its purpose was to investigate whether the students who participated in these trips received an appreciable benefit that they could articulate without prompting.

The questions on the survey were:

Question 1: Explain your rationale for your response to question 6.

Question 2: In as much detail as possible, please describe how comparing US and Belizean schools will impact your career as a teacher.

Question 3: In as much detail as possible, please describe how comparing US and Belizean schools has impacted you personally?

Question 4: Please describe how this experience taught you to embrace cultural differences.

Question 5: List the 3 most meaningful events of your faculty-led, study abroad experience.

Question 6: If you could do this trip again, what would you personally do to improve the experience?

Question 7: If you could eliminate something from this study abroad experience, what would it be?

Results

Students were encouraged to elaborate on their responses, which will most likely translate to a qualitative pre and post survey for the study after all preliminary work and the IRB request is done. This portion is expected to occur Spring 2022 following a new trip.

- Learned to build relationships and be more communal
- Learned to think outside of the borders of the U.S.

- a new awareness of different cultures
- importance of learning different languages
- Learned to be culturally sensitive
