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**STUDENT AFFAIRS AND CAMPUS LIFE COMMITTEE – April 18, 2022**

Campus Engagement & Leadership

Hosted Intercultural Competence with Alex Brandt from the School of Business (March 8) and Making Decisions as a Group: Leadership Lessons from Honeybees by Dr. Kaitlin Campbell, Assistant Professor in the Biology department (March 22) as part of the Leadership Workshop Series. SGA has announced election results. President-elect Taliyah Daniels and Vice President-elect Yamikal Hernández Sánchez are the incoming leadership. New member activities for fraternities and sororities are underway, post COVID restrictions. Hosted Angeline Bouley, author of Firekeeper's Daughter on March 28.

Campus Recreation

F45 fitness platform contract has been completed and implementation will coincide with the dance room renovation project. Daniel Perdue completed a Housing & Residence Life recreation facility assessment to inform renovation for projects. New funding targets have been set for the competitive sports complex project. Spring 2022 intramurals participation up 13% from Spring 2020. Academic year 2021-22: 27% of all Wellness Center participants are freshman; up from 18% during academic year 2020-21.

### CARE Team

The CARE Team has currently received 126 reports since the beginning of spring 2022 semester. Top student concerns include emotional distress, financial distress, grief/loss and social relationship issues. Students are currently being serviced in their residence halls, classrooms, the Student Affairs office and via Webex/phone. Impacts of COVID remain a challenge for students as they attempt to adjust to “normalcy”. Students are primarily referred to confidential resources due to increases in emotional distress. Reports are currently lower than last semester, which ended at 235 cases.

### Career Center

Career Center has hosted four virtual Career Fairs: Allied Health Career Fair had 535 students in attendance; Part-Time Job and Volunteer Fair had 220 students in attendance. In addition to the career fairs, the Career Center has hosted the following larger scale programming: Murder Mystery (in collaboration with the Library) on March 22, Escape Room (in collaboration with OSID) on March 31, JCPenney Suit-Up on March 27, Meet and Greet with Bakari Sellers on February 28, and Evening with Joshua Shipman and Chris Adams on March 3. The Career Center has provided counseling appointments to over 800 students. Further, the Career Center is providing weekly mobile career services to students to increase Career Center access.

### Community & Civic Engagement

The Office for Community & Civic Engagement was awarded \$40,000 from the Public Schools of Robeson County to hire students to serve as academic success mentors and tutors in the public schools. UNCP students will be hired, trained, and placed in schools throughout the county to assist with academic coaching and tutoring. In addition to the funds provided by the PSRC, students with federal work study can use their work study positions to serve in this same role. The office expects to place approximately 20-30 students this spring.

### Counseling & Psychological Services

Counseling & Psychological Services has awarded over \$3,600 in micro-grants to assist students with offcampus mental health support with more funding available. Our candidate search for the new Counselor-in-Residence position continues and our office is hosting two excursion opportunities this spring through the Collegiate Recovery Community to promote alternative coping strategies and harm reduction for students committed to sober living.

### Housing & Residence Life

We will be administering the ACUHO-I/Benchworks Resident Assessment in April. This national survey will be available to all residential students to complete, offering an assessment and benchmarking of the housing and residence life program. This survey was last completed in 2019, prior to COVID-19. For the first time since summer 2019, we will be offering summer housing for camps and conferences. As well, New Student Orientation will return to overnight housing as part of the program. New to this year, we will be offering on campus housing to parents and families during NSO. We welcomed Ms. KaTonya Alford to the position of Housing Assignment Coordinator. Ms. Alford previously served as the Administrative Support Associate in the Housing & Residence Life Office. On March 4, the Housing & Residence Life Office recognized the service of recent retirees. As well, we celebrated the lives of two retired staff members who recently passed away.

### Student Conduct

The Office of Student Conduct has updated the Settlement of a Violation of the Academic Honor Code online form and Dr. Dutnell attended the Academic Affairs leadership meeting to introduce and discuss the form as well as the process. As a result, multiple academic departments have invited Dr. Dutnell to their meetings to present this information to faculty. Graduate intern, Brittney Fenick, is continuing her Capstone Project work on Braves Seeking Help – a good Samaritan protocol - to remove any potential barriers and facilitate access to emergency medical care in cases of alcohol or drug related medical emergencies. Student Worker, Tiffany Hunt, has been conducting research on the use of staff/faculty mentors as part of an assigned educational outcome within student conduct. Quality mentoring relationships provide the opportunity for powerful positive effects on students in a variety of personal, academic, and professional ways.

### Student Health Services

Student Health Services (SHS) is supporting the university-wide efforts to mitigate the spread of COVID. We are proud to be able to continue to offer free COVID-19 testing through the remainder of the semester to all campus community members. SHS is still an active COVID-19 vaccination provider and we have provided more than 275 vaccines this semester, including booster shots. We began a COVID-19 booster incentive program beginning on the first day of classes. To date, we have 41% employees and 20% students that have received their COVID-19 boosters. SHS was also the recipient of the CoVAC mini grant for the spring semester. This grant allowed us to create and recruit three student paid internship positions. Their aim is to lead the educational effort on our campus to educate our students on COVID-19, vaccines, prevention efforts and provide incentives for students who attend and participate in our programs. On April 12, SHS hosted Pony Palooza in collaboration with numerous Student Affairs departments and student organizations. The event was open to employees and students and is designed to provide bring awareness and support of interpersonal violence prevention.

### Student Inclusion and Diversity

March featured events related to Women's History Month, Disability Awareness Month and Irish American Heritage Month. A Hispanic student mixer was enjoyed by more than 100 students, and included traditional Hispanic foods prepared by Sodexo. During April, events were held to celebrate Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month, Pride Month, Autism Awareness Week and Scottish American Heritage. Yom HaShoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) was also celebrated
