Dr. Barbara Trepagnier, Professor of Sociology from Texas State University, will talk about silent racism—the negative thoughts and beliefs about African Americans and other people of color held by “non racist” whites. Barbara’s research shows that all individuals harbor some racist thoughts and feelings, and that this subtle form of racism, more than the racial hatred of bigots, produces institutional racism and causes racial inequality. The oppositional categories of racist/not racist are outdated, and should be replaced in contemporary thought with a continuum model that more accurately portrays racial reality in the United States today.

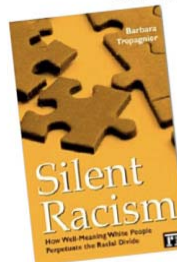
